When I was a little girl, I used to sing my brother bedtime songs. My parents caught me and started me singing publicly; training me as an opera singer and in Theatre Arts. Although most of my social life revolved around singing along with The Sound of Music and having lengthy conversations with my dolls, as time went on I received enough awards to get a scholarship to go to university as an early admit student. Being more introspective, I gave it up as soon as possible in order to develop my spiritual potential, rather then my ego. I am a self taught painter. Painting offers creative expression without attachment to the finished product. My per-

sonal involvement isn't required, which is better suited for me. The painting, once completed, is an offering for the viewer.

The objective of my painting is to embrace the viewer by selecting subjects that portray the common denominators between people. While traveling abroad and domestically I take photographs, from which sections are combined to create an image that communicates familiar experiences. The central themes of work, play, relationships, and daily sustenance are interconnected throughout the paintings. The images of basic life experiences create

a venue for the viewer to transfer themselves into a similar world. My objective is to use art as a means of unification. By transcending time and place, I try to provide an entrance point to empathize with people outside our daily routine.

I prefer thoughtprovoking, emotionally stimulating, easily identifiable subjects. The fluid, fragmented por-

trait of the body provides the juxtaposition with the dogma of the scene. I have rather poor eyesight, so the bodies are shaped through my memory and sense of weight. movement, and the emotional body language of the subjects. Paint is applied with steel wool and paintbrushes are used for the details. My paintings are not physically accurate or intellectually challenging. To reach people is to feel their souls. That is my goal as a painter

I send slides and photos to galleries, art spaces, etc. and share with whoever wants the work; never being concerned about rejection or acceptance. With the help of Jampa Thinlay, who delivers the paintings with me, and

Rick Nelson, who lets us drop off work for the Chamber of Commerce show in the evenings, I have been able to participate in numerous exhibits.

The SF MOMA Artists Gallery has represented me for over a decade, including a special group show last year, as well as letting me participate in their annual warehouse event. Although I have never been fond of the concept of competition, I have been included in several international juried shows.

After searching since May 2007, a company from Norway, Ementor, located my painting, "The Place to Be" They held an essay competition for their 3000 + employees, about the idea of the ti-

tle, which is the same as their slogan. Ementor sent the 11 winners to visit with me and collect the piece. The original is on display at their main headquarters, and duplications are at their other locations.

I am currently working on a series of eight pieces for The Gallery of Urban Art, for a solo show in October, 2008. The paintings for that show will be featured in a book sometime in 2009. I also have several paintings at the Albany Arts Gallery and am looking forward to participating in the many exhibits scheduled for this year, with the help of my friend, Jampa Thinlay.

6.



Exhibit Rules

CHAIR: John Mallon

RECEIVING: Friday, March 14, 2008 from 10 AM until 12 noon at the Presbyterian Church, 4101 Park Blvd., Oakland. Enter parking lot from Hampel Street.

JUROR: Ms. Karen Tsujimoto (Senior Curator of the Oakland Museum of California)

ACCEPTED WORKS: Pick up at the Presbyterian Church on Friday May 16th, 2008 between 10 AM and 12 noon.

ENTRIES:

Entries will be two dimensional; 16"x 20" mini. and 36"x 36" max. Only 1 entry accepted per member.

Artwork depicting iconic scenes of San Francisco are not appropriate for this venue! If entered, artwork in this category may be rejected at the sole discretion of the show chairman.

Because only 7 "large" (i.e. over 24"X30") works can be displayed in the show space, only the first 7 "large" pieces will be accepted, unless specifically allowed by the Show Chair.

Works restricted to original work – no class work or copies.

Nudes and political statements are not accepted (venue requirement).

All work must be for sale.

The Chamber reserves the right to reject any work from the show for any reason.

Any work shown at a Chamber of Commerce Show **prior to** March 2005 may be shown again at this show. Any work having won a cash award in any OAA show is not eligible to receive another cash award but may receive a merit award.

To be entered as a single work, any grouping of 2 or more works must be mounted within a single frame which meets the overall size requirements.

ENTRY FEE: \$8.00 per entry.

FRAMING:

No wide (may not exceed 3") or elaborate frames will be accepted.

Mats must be clean and well cut.

Frames must be clean, sturdy and no protruding screw eyes or hangers will be allowed.

Works larger than 24" x 30" (if covered) must be under plastic instead of glass.

LABELS: Must be filled out completely and affixed to the upper left hand corner on the back of the entry.

PLEASE TYPE OR PRINT LEGIBLY!

AWARDS: First award \$100; Second award \$50; Third award \$25. Merit awards are given at the discretion of the Juror.

INSURANCE: A waiver must be signed on receiving day.

SALES:

All sales made during the show and/or 30days following the close of the show (if the work was seen by the buyer at the show) will be handled by the Treasurer (Stan Cohen 510 553-3003).

OAA policy is that no change will be made in the price (in connection with this show) after the work is accepted.
