

Featured OAA Artist: Wenda Pyman

My interested started in black & white photography, while dabbling in photography in high school. After moving to California, struggling to grasp the Zone System, I enrolled in a Yosemite workshop with Ansel Adams in 1978. Finding the Zone System unsatisfactory with 35mm film, I switched to color. My inspiration then came from Eliot Porter, Art Wolfe, David Muench and Larry Ulrich, whose images I studied closely. Through their eyes I learned the "art of seeing".

In 1983, I started my photography business. Little did I realize how that move has impacted my life today. As a land-scape, travel and nature photographer based in the San Francisco Bay Area, my vast body of work reflects my all consuming

passion to capture nature's diverse imagery, patterns and colors, both locally and worldwide. I belong to the ASMP (American Society of Media Photographers), as well as the East Bay Art organizations OAA and LAA. When I am not chasing the right light in Viet Nam, Sri lanka, India or New Guinea. I do the next best thing - capture the moments on Mount Diablo and the regional parks.

Currently I am digitizing my 50,000+ slides and building a stock photo database to best serve my clients. I can be found at a retail store, Hand Works of Danville, as well as the Moraga Art Gallery. I have been published in numerous calendars, CD album covers and Palm Press cards.

From John's Library:

Editors note: John Mallon continually culls tidbits of wisdom from his readings and has offered to pass them along to us from time to time. These passages are footnoted and presented in original authors words, any changes are unintended typographical errors.

"If you understand your painting before-hand, you might as well not paint it. Painting, as Leonardo da Vinci proved, is superior to all the other arts, because it is directed to the most noble and divine of all the organs, the eye. To compare the ear to the eye would be as absurd as to compare the nose to the ear. The first art with which the painter must make himself familiar is before and above all architecture - it will be for you a

very superior "frozen music", since it addresses itself not to the ear but to the noblest organ, the eye. And in the optical solidity of architecture your sensibility will quickly distinguish, without anyone's teaching you, what is rhythmical and what is musical to your eye, for it is of rhythm and of melody that all the forms which you are to utilize are composed."

"For Landscapes – always and without exception mix in more or less perceptible doses for every kind of shadow some Naples Yellow, which is the atmospheric color par excellence; to use this color whenever your shadows are invaded by air and even by breezes."

Easel was borrowed from Dutch EZEL, which means literally "donkey" (this is related to the English ASS). The notion of loading a painting on to a stand, much as a burden is loaded on to a donkey, is echoed in the use of CLOTHESHORSE for a stand for hanging clothes on to dry or air."

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Carol Tarzier to Judge May 19 Chamber Show

Editors note: We are fortunate to have an artist of Ms. Tarzier's experience to judge our upcoming Chamber show. Following is her Artists Statement that she thoughtfully sent to us.



I work for the most part figuratively, in drawing, sculpture, and painting. But I love both figurative and abstract work, and the best work incorporates elements of both.

My sculpture career began in 1993, a few years after arriving in the San Francisco Bay Area. I began by working in waterbased clay, which led me to loose representations of the human form; early sculptures were loose portraits and expressionistic, gestural figures. I moved into a different direction in the last several years, with a series of "Contemporary Classical" work: high-polish classically perfected sculpture with a contemporary feel. These sculptures are about the beauty of form and form as communicating mood and emotion. In addition I completed two major life-sized commissioned bronzes, the C.L. Dellums Memorial in Oakland and the George Hasslein Memorial for Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo.

Along with the sculpture, I have worked extensively from the model on black paper. My drawings explore the effect of light on the human form. I used the pastel on black to create a trajectory of light. In a reclining pose, the model falls toward the viewer, and I follow the light. In

a standing pose, I create an architecture of light on the form, from the bottom moving upward.

I've recently returned to an early focus – oil painting. We are working from the model in oils in my studio several days per week in open sessions. And being outdoors working on plein air painting has been bringing me great joy over the last six months. This is the latest adventure in a wonderful exploration of the possibilities of representational work.

At Pro Arts Open Studios this year I will be showing a wide variety – landscape paintings, classical sculptures, new modern sculpture, and work from the figure in oils.

Paintings sold at Auction:

Some time ago, Honorary Member Norma Kraus and her family made a gift to our association of thirty five of her large oil paintings. Although the board of directors considered several possibilities in managing this resource, it was ultimately decided that the paintings should be sold. After some recommenda-

tion and consideration, Clars Auction Gallery in Oakland was selected as the seller, and with the help of members Stan Cohen and Rick Nelson the paintings were offered in various live auctions as well as through Clars "on-line" venue. Over the course of about 5 months the paintings were all sold, with \$425 being the highest price paid for a single canvas. The entire sale grossed about \$4200, which after commissions left \$3050 added to our general fund. The Board has written to Norma and the family re expressing OAA's gratitude for this fine gift.

RECEIVING: Friday, May 19th, 2006 from 10 AM until 12 noon at the Presbyterian Church, 4101 Park Blvd., Oakland. Enter parking lot from Hempel Street.

JUROR: Carol Tarzier.

ACCEPTED WORKS: Pick up at the Presbyterian Church on Friday July 21st between 10 AM and 12 noon.

ENTRIES:

- Only one large (36" x 36") picture per member, plus two smaller works can be submitted, due to limited space.
- All two dimensional media 16" x 20" minimum and 36" x 36" maximum.
- Works restricted to original work no class work or copies.
- Nudes and political statements are not accepted (venue requirement).
- · All work must be for sale.
- · Up to three works may be submitted; three may be accepted.
- Any work shown at a Chamber of Commerce Show prior to 2003 may be shown again at this show. Any work having won a cash award in any OAA show is not eligible to receive another cash award but may receive a merit award.
- To be entered as a single work, any grouping of 2 or more works must be mounted within a single frame which meets the overall size requirements.

ENTRY FEE: \$8.00 per entry.

FRAMING:

- No wide (may not exceed 3") or elaborate frames will be accepted.
- · Mats must be clean and well cut.
- Frames must be clean, sturdy and no protruding screw eyes or hangers will be allowed.
- Works on paper larger than 24" x 30" must be under plastic; smaller works may be under glass.

<u>LABELS:</u> Must be filled out completely and affixed to the upper left hand corner on the back of the entry.

PLEASE TYPE OR PRINT LEGIBLY!

AWARDS: First award \$100; Second award \$50; Third award \$25. Merit awards are given at the discretion of the Juror.

INSURANCE: A signed waiver must be on file with the Membership Chairman or be filled out and signed on receiving day.

SALES:

- All sales made during the show and/or 30days following the close of the show (if the work was seen by the buyer at the show) will be handled by the Treasurer (Stan Cohen 510 553-3003).
- OAA policy is that no change will be made in the price (in connection with this show) after the
 work is accepted.
- The artist agrees that 30% of the sale price will be taken as a contribution to OAA.
- Sales tax of 8.75% will be added to all sales.
