## **George Ehrenhaft**

My father, a New York stockbroker, painted oils and watercolors in his spare time, making a name for himself as a gifted amateur. Hoping I would follow his example, he presented me with a sketchbook when I was twelve. "Draw what you see," he instructed. To his dismay, I copied cartoons from the newspaper. On other pages I drew imaginary houses with chimneys billowing huge clouds of black smoke. My interior scenes were dominated by a giant stone hearth, flames shooting from the fireplace. These drawings, while suggesting an unnatural appetite for pyromania, may also have hinted at a nascent affinity for the shapes of buildings and roofs, although as far as I know, no one noticed.

On Sunday afternoons my father sometimes took me. my older brother Peter, and a handful of pencils on sketching excursions to the country. "Study the trees and hills," he said. "Look at the sky. Clouds make fine subjects." He and Peter filled their books with lovely landscapes, while I drew subways and city streets. Once, on a shining spring day we sat beside a stream, its grassy banks studded with tall shade trees. Birds sang, boys fished in the distance. "Here's a perfect spot," my father said. An hour later I had drawn the inside of a movie theater -- the screen, the proscenium, rows of seats, and the backs of people's heads. My father looked stricken.

In the car en route home he said to Peter, "I don't understand your brother."

By dying when I was still in college, my father never saw his subversive son venture into watercolor painting, an endeavor that didn't begin until I retired from a career teaching high school English.

Largely selftaught, I've become a painter in perpetual flux, ever searching for my particular niche. I keep experimenting with styles and techniques from realistic to a vaguely abstract,

from dry to wet, from a limited palette to virtually every color in the spectrum.

Watercolor is such an unpredictable medium that I'm often surprised at the results of my efforts -- both good and bad. I usually do the same painting two or three times, until I either get sick of it or get it right. Roughly three out of four end up in the trash.

I've been overjoyed at the response to my paintings. Many people who are not my mother have said nice things about them and have even paid good money for the right to hang them on their walls.

When I first applied paint to paper, I had no artistic affiliations. Then I became more or less active in assorted art societies, groups, guilds, associations and centers . Since moving from

between 3pm and 6pm. www.valleyartgallery.org





CHAIR: John Mallon

**RECEIVING:** Friday, September 18, 2009 from 10 AM until 12 noon at the Presbyterian Church, 4101 Park Blvd., Oakland. Enter parking lot from Hampel Street.

JUROR: Oakland Chamber of Commerce Staff

ACCEPTED WORKS: Pick up at the Presbyterian Church on Friday November 20, 2009 between 10 AM and 12 noon.

**ENTRIES:** Only the first 20 entries will be accepted due to space limitations. Only 1 entry will be accepted per member, unless too few pieces are entered before the 12 noon deadline, in which case the Show Chairman **may** accept additional works provided they are immediately available, up to a grand total of 20 entries.

Entries will be two dimensional; 16"x 20" min. and 36"x 36" max. - nominal size including mats.

**Artworks depicting iconic scenes of San Francisco are not appropriate for this venue!** If entered, artwork in this category may be rejected at the sole discretion of the show chairman.

Because only 7 "large" (i.e. over 24"X30") works can be displayed in the show space, only the first 7 "large" pieces will be accepted, unless specifically allowed by the Show Chair.

Works restricted to original work – no class work or copies. Nudes and political statements are not accepted (venue requirement). All work must be for sale. The Chamber reserves the right to reject any work from the show for any reason.

Any work shown at a Chamber of Commerce Show **prior to** September 2006 may be shown again at this show. Any work having won a cash award in any OAA show is not eligible to receive another cash award but may receive a merit award.

To be entered as a single work, any grouping of 2 or more works must be mounted within a single frame which meets the overall size requirements.

**ENTRY FEE:** \$8.00 per entry.

**FRAMING:** No wide (may not exceed 3") or elaborate frames will be accepted.

Mats must be clean and well cut and frames must be clean, sturdy and no protruding screw eyes or hangers will be allowed.

Works larger than 24" x 30" (if covered) must be under plastic instead of glass.

**LABELS:** Must be filled out completely and affixed to the upper left hand corner on the back of the entry.

#### PLEASE TYPE OR PRINT LEGIBLY!

**AWARDS:** First award \$100; Second award \$50; Third award \$25. Merit awards are given at the discretion of the Juror.

**INSURANCE:** A waiver must be signed on receiving day.

#### SALES:

All sales made during the show and/or 30days following the close of the show (if the work was seen by the buyer at the show) will be handled by the Sales Chairman Stan Cohen 510 533-3003.

OAA policy is that no change will be made in the price (in connection with this show) after the work is accepted.

The artist agrees that 30% of the sale price will be taken as a contribution to OAA.

Sales tax of 8.75% will be added to all sales.
